How Do I Apply to VR?

- Visit RehabWorks.org or call your local VR office
- 2. Tell school staff you're interested
- 3. Get a VR referral from your school
- 4. Meet with VR counselor to learn more about VR
- Complete your VR Application, signed by parent/guardian or student 18 or older
- A VR counselor determines whether you are eligible for services. If eligible, a plan is developed.

How do I Sign up for the STAR Program?

- 1. Tell school staff you're interested
- 2. Get a VR referral from your school
- 3. Meet with VR staff to discuss options
- 4. Get services

WHO QUALIFIES FOR TRANSITION YOUTH PROGRAMS?

Students age 15-21 who:

- Are in high school OR enrolled in training or education after high school
- Have an IEP or 504 Plan
- Have a condition that interferes with preparing for, getting, or keeping a job

THE TRANSITION YOUTH PROGRAM IS:

- Offered when school is not in session (after school, evenings, weekends, holidays, spring break, summer, early release days)
- Free to students

What are My Transition Program Choices?

- 1. STAR Program
 - School identifies you as a student with an IEP or 504 Plan
 - You complete STAR referral
- 2. Traditional VR
 - You apply at a VR office
 - VR counselor determines you eligible
 - You and your counselor complete a plan for services

BOTH TRADITIONAL VR & STAR OFFER PRE-EMPLOYMENT TRANSITION SERVICES

- Career Exploration Counseling Includes skills, abilities, aptitudes, interest assessments, and postsecondary options
- Work Readiness Training A 20-hour course that focuses on employability and work-readiness skills
- Community-Based Work Experiences Includes hands-on training for employability skills
- Self-Advocacy A two-part course that teaches you how to speak up for yourself and make decisions about your own life

Work Readiness Training

Teaches students to:

- Write a resume
- Interview properly
- Search and apply for jobs online
- Find and complete job applications
- Manage employer contacts
- Handle conflict
- Navigate public transportation
- Review employee benefits, if needed

Community-Based Work Experiences

Allows students to:

- Apply and practice soft social skills
- Gain an idea of work
- Develop work skills
- Build relationships leading to job references
- Identify work accommodations

Self-Advocacy Training

Focuses on:

- Self-awareness
- Understanding your rights
- Setting goals
- Requesting reasonable accommodations
- Becoming career ready
- Developing an action plan
- Learning to self-advocate
