Dear Parents:

On June 13, 2008, Governor Crist signed into law Senate Bill 856. The bill, called "Disability History and Awareness Instruction," requires school districts to designate the first two weeks of October as Disability History and Awareness Weeks. The bill also encourages schools to provide information about disability history and promote the awareness of the contributions of individuals with disabilities.

One of every five Americans is a person with a disability. A person may be born with a disability. A person may acquire a disability through an accident or illness. A person may acquire a disability simply as a part of growing older. Despite the fact that disability is a natural part of life, people with disabilities have not always had access to equal opportunities. Not until 1975, with the passage of the federal Education for All Handicapped Children Act, did school-aged children with disabilities have a right to a free appropriate public education.

Florida started the first special education class in 1926 in Jacksonville. Since 1926, specially designed instruction and related services have expanded throughout Florida. Now, approximately 401,700 students identified with disabilities are participating in Florida's public education and are graduating and going on to postsecondary education or employment. In St. Johns County, over 7,000 students are identified as students with disabilities.

We are proud to participate in promoting awareness of disability history and contributions of individuals with disabilities. At the regular school board meeting on October 13, 2020, I will ask that the board adopt a resolution to designate the first two weeks in October 2020 as Disability History and Awareness Weeks.


Social emotional learning (SEL) is the natural process of developing the life skills that will enable a person to better manage emotions, interact well with others, and make effective decisions. Within the realm of education, the CASEL (Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning) organization is considered the "gold standard" of SEL research and theory. CASEL categorizes SEL skills into five ability groupings called competencies. Below are the five competencies, a brief explanation of each, and associated skills:

Self-awareness	the knowledge of one's own thoughts, feelings, and motiva- tions	identifying emotions accurate self-perception recognizing strengths self-confidence self-efficacy
Self-management	the regulation of emotions and actions in a variety of environ- ments	impulse control stress management self-discipline self-motivation goal setting organizational skills
Social awareness	the capacity to empathize and appreciate another perspective	perspective-taking empathy appreciating diversity respect for others
Relationship skills	the means to create and main- tain healthy relationships	Communication social engagement relationship-building teamwork
Responsible decision-making	the ability to make responsible choices and accept their out- come	identifying problems analyzing situations solving problems evaluating reflecting ethical responsibility

This section of *Parents as Partners* will provide a suggested activity for the first competency, Self-Awareness. Understand that these are broad suggestions that may be appropriate or not based on student age or ability-level. If a suggestion doesn't fit, modify or substitute it as needed. Hopefully these exercises will be a helpful resource for you.

It is also important to know that the best way to teach children social emotional skills is to model them. When you have the opportunity, reflect on these skill categories to determine if you have opportunities for improvement. No one is perfect, so be honest about the areas in which you can grow. When you identify areas that could be strengthened, discuss it with your child. This is a great example of our first activity that supports self-awareness, *encourage a growth mindset*.

Encourage a Growth Mindset (Self-awareness): "Growth mindset" is a term coined by Dr. Carol Dweck in her book <u>Mindset</u>. The book chiefly outlines the idea that skills, including things like math and artistic ability, are learned and can be improved. According to Dweck, effort and determination play much more essential roles than natural talent. Parents should encourage and praise effort in their children instead of performance. The belief is children will continue to put forth effort if they think the same outcome will be seen. However, if they reach a point of challenge and do not believe success is likely, they won't put in the effort for fear of failure. Praising effort instead of outcome should mitigate that tendency. The practice of praising effort should also create a safe space in the relationship to admit shortcomings.


## Keira Knightley

### Mission Statement: To identify and meet the unique educational needs of exceptional students and to provide support and resources to enhance educational opportunities so they become productive citizens.

ESE programs and services address the unique needs of students who are gifted in kindergarten through 12th grade and those with mild, moderate and severe disabilities from age three until they graduate with a regular diploma or until their 22nd birthday. ESE programs and services are designed to assist students in reaching their educational goals through the use of instructional and behavioral approaches which are research-based and exemplify best practices. Technology is used in many creative ways to meet student needs as well.

ESE services are available at all district schools for gifted students and students who have mild to moderate disabilities. PreK students with disabilities and students with more significant disabilities are served in cluster programs at selected sites. Program support is provided to students, parents and school personnel by program specialists based at the district office. Students with disabilities who are not eligible for services through the ESE program may be eligible for an accommodations plan under Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973.
