What is Title!?

Title I is a supplementary federally funded educational program. The program is implemented in qualifying schools to provide an enriched and accelerated learning environment for students. Achievement of high academic standards is promoted through the services and resources provided by Title I funds.

Parents Right to Know

As a parent of a student attending a St. Johns County School, you have the right to know the professional qualifications of the teachers and/or paraprofessionals who instruct your child. Federal aw allows you to ask for certain information about your child's teachers and/or paraprofessionals and requires the school to provide you with this information in a timely manner. The Parents Right to Know is distributed to the parents or guardians of students attending Title I schools. Parents can be assured that they will be informed of their child's level of achievement on The Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (FAST) and other assessments throughout the school year. Please read below about your rights to know about the qualifications of teachers.

Parents may request:

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- Whether a teacher is state certified.
- Whether a teacher is teaching under emergency or other provisional status.
- The bachelor's degree major of the teacher and any other graduate degree major or certification.
- Whether a child is provided services by paraprofessionals and, if so, their qualifications.
 - The level of achievement of your child on each of the State academic assessments

The process for requesting information:

• Parents, guardians, or the general public may make request, either in writing or verbally, directly to the school or district office.

The process for providing information:

- Upon receipt of either a verbal or written request, the information will be provided in a timely manner.
- Requested information will be provided in the same manner in which it was received, i.e. email or letter.

The goal of Title I is to ensure that all students, especially those from a lower economic status, receive a fair, equal and significant opportunity to acquire a highquality education. All public schools in St. Johns County receiving Title I funds are classified as school-wide Title I schools. This entitles all students attending a Title I school the opportunity to participate in and receive all additional academic support supplemented through Title I funds. The Title I Department helps schools:

- Comply with Title I regulations;
- Inform parents about Title I guidelines
- Involve parents in appropriate Title I initiatives to include family literacy activities, trainings, and meetings
- Provide accommodations for parents to further enable their participation
- Offer instruction and materials to parents to enhance their child's academic development.

Individualized Student Interventions

Each Title I school is provided additional school resources to meet the needs of the students. Students who need academic or behavior support are provided a Response to Intervention (RTI) plan to address their specific needs. Parents are encouraged to be part of these meetings, and to take an active role in their child's education. The state legislature has provided each school with flexibility to meet the unique needs of the students they serve.

Parent Family Engagement Plan

Parent Family Engagement Plans are created to ensure the meaningful participation of parents in schools. Schools that receive Title I funding are required to have a Parent Family Engagement Plan. This policy addresses parental involvement activities and the means to improve communication between the home and school. The Title I Parent Family Engagement Plan is included in the School Improvement Plan and on the school website. Hard copies are available at the school site.

Research indicates that students improve academically when their parents are actively involved. Parents are encouraged to actively participate in their child's education by:

- Knowing what Florida Standards their child is expected to master
- Attending the annual Title I Annual Meeting & Open House and other school meetings and activities
- Conferencing with school personnel and completing a School/Parent Compact
- Completing the school needs assessment survey
- Assisting in the development of the Parent Family Engagement Plan (PFEP) and other Title I initiatives
- Talking to their child about school and reinforcing learning at home

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School-Parent Compact

The School/Parent Compact is an agreement between parents, students, and teachers. The purpose of the compact is to establish a partnership between the home and school, which is necessary to maximize student learning. Compacts are created at the beginning of each school year during a parent/teacher conference and should be reviewed, evaluated, and modified throughout the year.

Title I Funding

Title I funds are appropriated annually to supplement schools having the highest percentage of students eligible for free or reduced lunch. Those funds are used to:

- Extend learning opportunities for students needing additional academic support;
- Train teachers and paraprofessionals;
- Hire supplemental teachers and paraprofessionals;
- Purchase instructional equipment and intervention materials; and
- Support parent involvement activities.

Title I School Responsibilities

- Establish strategies that provide all students an opportunity to meet the Florida Standards.
- Provide remediation to students experiencing difficulty mastering the Florida Standards.
- Develop a school-based Parent Involvement Plan jointly with parents.
- Hold an annual Title I open meeting for parents.
- Prepare a School/Parent Compact jointly with parents, teachers and students.
- Offer a needs assessment survey to parents.
- Offer professional development for teachers.
- Follow best practices regarding delivery of instruction.
- Create strategies to increase parent involvement to include authentic parent/teacher conferencing.
- Establish effective transitions from early childhood programs into kindergarten.
- Include teachers and parents in decision making processes.
